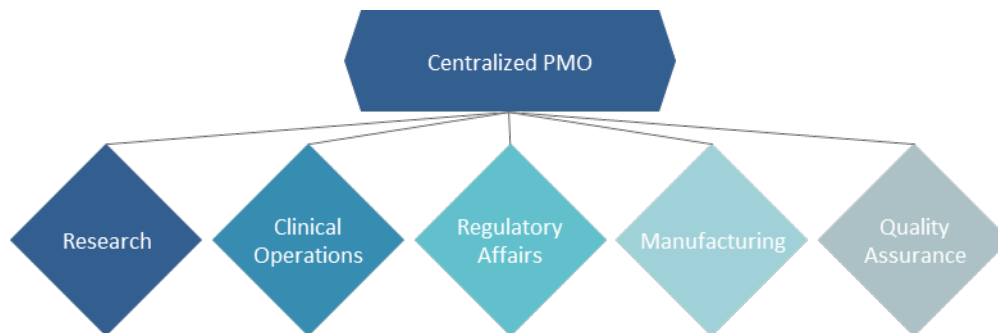

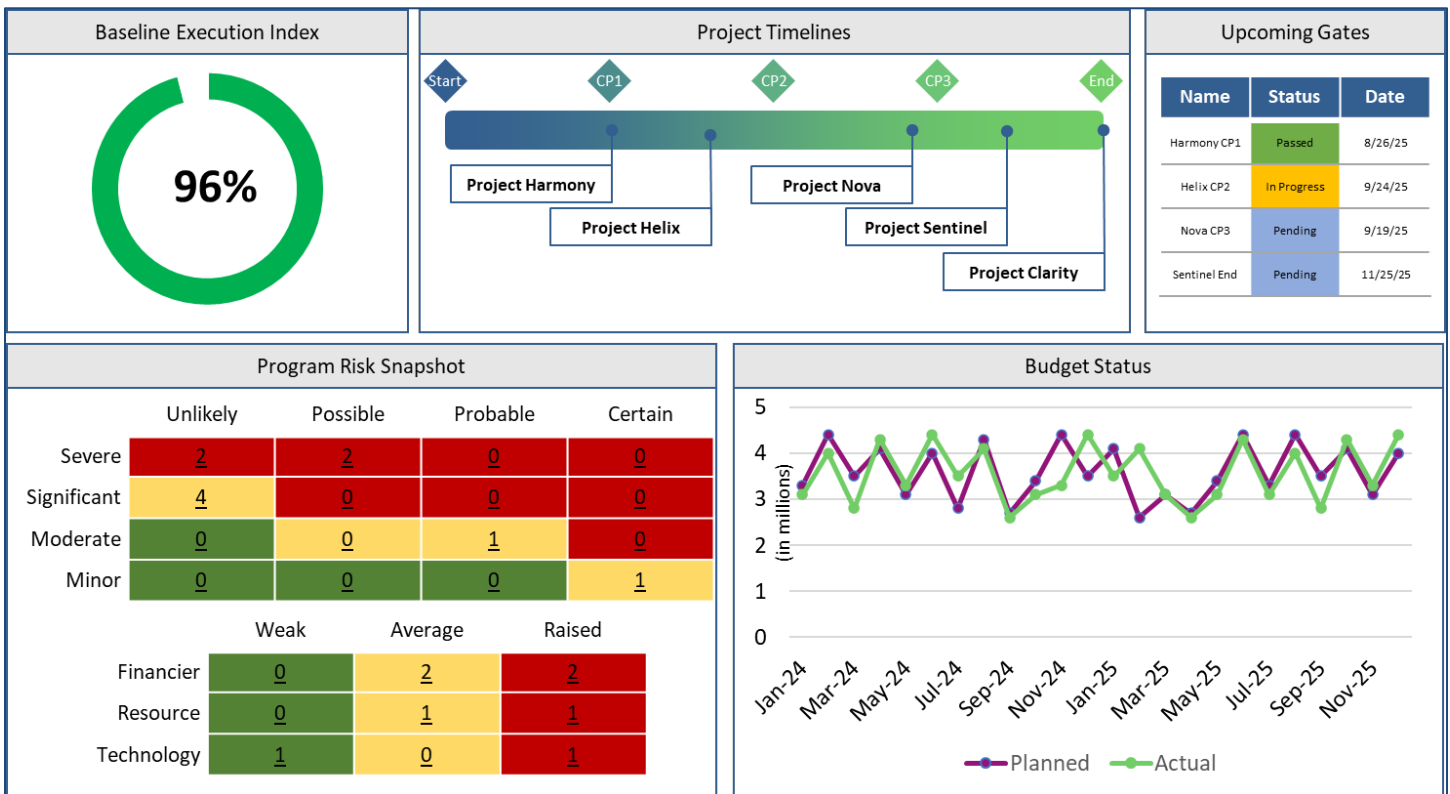
Enabling Alignment Across Departments
